Due to a reliance on volunteers, during some weeks it can be challenging to reach the current required hours as part of our key commitments. The radio station has on occasion had to rely on volunteers, whom have strong links to our broadcast area, but do not live within the Vale of Glamorgan. In addition, the age of some volunteers and the reduction of public transport provision following the pandemic makes it more difficult for them to attend the studio, coupled with a proposed reduction in studio opening times due to soaring energy costs, making it cheaper, safe and more convenient at off peak times, to produce shows from home. Some of our

	presenter live just outside of our core area, though, so their shows from home don't qualify as local content. his reduction will allow us to continue to provide locally relevant content, but utilise presenters broadcasting from outside of our coverage area.

Ofcom notes on the request

The request was AGREED, because Ofcom was satisfied in relation to Section 106(1A)(a) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as modified by the Community Radio Order 2004, and further modified by the Community Radio (Amendment) Orders 2010 and 2015) i.e. that the changes would not substantially alter the character of the service, and for the policy reasons given below.

The Licensee is requesting to reduce its Key Commitment on original output from a minimum requirement of 84 hours per day to 70 hours per week, a reduction of around 20% of its original output requirement. The Licensee is also requesting to reduce its requirement for locally-produced content from 91 hours per week to 77 hours per week, a reduction of roughly 15%. In requesting these changes, the Licensee has referred to the fact that it relies on volunteers, and that this can make it difficult at times to meet their current commitments. The Licensee has also referenced a plan to reduce its studio opening hours due to rising energy costs, and would instead utilise remote broadcasting technology to provide some of their content from outside the local area.

Ofcom is satisfied that these changes will not substantially alter the nature of the character of the programme service provided by Bro Radio, and the changes will not impact on the Licensee's ability to deliver the on-air service and its off-air social gain commitments, given that the Licensee has confirmed that a reduction in its studio hours will not prevent it from carrying out training programmes for new volunteers and young people. The request is to make modest reductions in original output and locally-produced output provision, and will provide the Licensee with more flexibility in the scheduling of its shows. It will also allow the Licensee to exercise more flexibility in how its volunteers broadcast on the service, in a way which is likely to improve its ability to recruit and retain volunteer presenters. In terms of our policy criteria, Ofcom is satisfied that the changes will not affect the station's ability to meet the community radio 'characteristics of service' set out in the legislation. We therefore decided to exercise our discretion to approve these changes.
